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Romance of the Bells: The California Missions in Art September 28, 2008 - January 4, 2009

Pasadena, CA – The images of rolling hills dotted with weathered adobe walls and red-tiled roofs featured in the exhibition *Romance of the Bells* are iconic markers of California's identity as a state. The first mission was founded by the Spanish in 1769, and from then until 1823, twenty-one California missions and a number of branch missions (*asistencias*) were built. Although that period spanned just over fifty years, there has been a lasting effect on the social and artistic history of California.

After Mexico's independence in 1822, the missions, which had been maintained by the Spanish, began to dissolve and decay. However, their intriguing combination of majesty and neglect made them popular subjects for artists. By 1850, when California became part of the United States, the missions were easily accessible to artists, and thus became an integral subject in the California Impressionist movement.

Not only has the significance of these old missions been immortalized in the naming of major California cities and roads, their beauty and grandeur have long been captured by artists who sought

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to record the unique historical heritage of old California. The exhibition features works by such important Impressionist painters as Franz Bischoff, Alson Clark, Joseph Kleitsch, Arthur G. Rider, Elmer Wachtel, and William Wendt, each bringing their own personal interpretation of the importance of these ruined structures.

Romance of the Bells is organized by the Irvine Museum and is supported by the Historical Collections Council of California, Josh Hardy Galleries, Robert Giem, and PMCA Board Member Simon Chiu.

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About the PMCA:

Admission:

\$7 for Adults, \$5 for Seniors (65+) and Students with valid ID; free to PMCA Members and children under 12. Access for people with disabilities is provided.

Location/Parking:

The Museum is located at 490 East Union Street. From the 210 Freeway, take the Lake Avenue exit. Go south and take a right on Union Street. From the 110 Freeway/Downtown Los Angeles, follow the freeway until its end, then take Arroyo Parkway and turn right at Colorado, then left at Oakland to get to Union Street. Parking is available at the Museum.

PMCA Tours:

At this time, the museum does not offer regularly scheduled docent tours of our special exhibitions. However, docent tours are available to private groups for a fee of \$75. A non-refundable deposit of \$40 is due two weeks prior to the scheduled date in order to guarantee a tour. We regret that we are unable to accommodate tours for groups smaller than 10 or larger than 50 people. Before requesting a tour, please check the exhibition calendar to see which exhibitions will be available during your visit.

A discounted group rate of \$3 per person is available for groups of 20 or more, and free admission is offered to school groups of K-12 public school students. Please call to notify us at least one week in advance for these special admission rates.
